In September, Grampians Health Ballarat and the Ballarat Health Services Foundation hosted a special Donor Thank You Event at the Ballarat Regional Soccer Facility at Morshead Park, Redan.

This event was all about expressing our gratitude to you, our incredible community donors, and highlighting how your contributions are making a significant impact on our public health service.



Donors heard from Matthew Drake, Paediatric Navigator of the Grampians Health at Home service, who shared how community donations helped launch the paediatric care at home program:

“Last Christmas, thanks to the generosity of 350 donors, we were able to purchase essential equipment that allowed us to care for over 500 children in their homes, saving more than 1,500 nights in hospital in under a year. Community donations have been crucial in expanding the program quickly, providing vital care to children and families when they need it most.”

Nearly 100 of you, our donors, also heard from Jasmine Meier, whose daughter Lola, is supported by the Paediatric at Home program. Jasmine shared how the service has allowed their family to stay together at home while Lola receives ongoing treatment, significantly reducing her time spent in hospital.



Leaving a legacy of exceptional public healthcare

Bequests to Grampians Health Ballarat or the Ballarat Health Services Foundation are amongst the most powerful donations we receive. We recently received a bequest (Gift in a Will) from a former resident of an aged care home in Ballarat. We were graciously included with seven other charities as beneficiaries.

Her gift allowed us to purchase equipment for prostate cancer treatment, maternity ward and outpatients clinic, and our respiratory ward. In July, Ballarat Petanque Club's Family Fun Night raised a whopping \$20,045 for our Cancer Wellness Centre. The event, held at Ballarat East Bowling Club, was inspired by the late Anthony Clancy, a beloved club member who received care at the Centre. With the dedication of Gordon and Pam Oliver, and incredible community support, this vision became a reality. Over 130 attendees, enjoyed a night full of fun activities like raffles, a silent auction, wine and cheese tasting, bingo, trivia, cornhole and a Kid's Corner packed with games. The funds raised cover approximately a third of our Centre's annual operating costs, ensuring the continuation of essential services including over 3,000 appointments and support group sessions each year..

Reworn Market reached new heights in August raising a record of over \$4,000 for our Cancer Wellness Centre. With 488 people pouring through the doors of the historic Mining Exchange, the atmosphere was buzzing as attendees supported a great cause while celebrating sustainable fashion. Guests indulged in delicious paella and churros from The Paella Guy, sold out the cakes from Mrs. Browne Bakes and enjoyed live music by the talented father-daughter team, Freya and Tom McGowan. A massive thank you to Jacqui Jarvis and Rochelle Tournier, the dynamic duo behind Reworn Market, for their partnership with our health service.

Congratulations to all our 34 Dry July participants. This year, we raised over \$48,000 for our Cancer Centre and Wellness Centre, the largest public provider of cancer treatment services in Western Victoria. We've been blown away by the incredible support from our participants and their supporters, making this one of our best years yet. Every year, we provide cancer care to over 300 public patients, delivering over 3800 episodes of treatment. This includes care for over 140 patients receiving treatment at home. We currently have 57 clinical trials in Oncology and Haematology, from phase I through to phase III and follow-up. Cheers to another successful year of Dry July.

The Maternity Unit is Pumped

Thanks to the generous support of the Humpty Dumpty Foundation, we've received two brand-new breast pumps, ready to help our tiniest patients get the very best start in life. These pumps are truly a game changer for families in our Special Care Nursery and Maternity Unit, especially for those baby's who can't breastfeed just yet.

Lactation Consultant, Jan Mitchell, highlights the importance: "Having access to a pump is a vital part of the breastfeeding journey for the mum's long-term health and the baby's well-being. Studies show that morbidity and mortality rates are affected when there is limited access to breast pumps."

With over 1,400 babies born at the Base Hospital in 2023, we experienced a shortage of pumps and had to hire them to keep up with the demand.

"They're a great addition to our existing stock. Breastfeeding is a big part of babies' recovery, it's whole food that helps them grow strong and healthy." Jan says.

We're thrilled to have the support of the Humpty Dumpty Foundation, ensuring our little ones and their families are well taken care of.
